# TRASH & RECYCLING

From the Desk of Joe Gonnering

The Town of Trenton shares the

frustration of many residents who have had issues with their trash and recycling collection service of late. We are working with Waste Management to resolve these issues and we appreciate your continued patience.

The contract with Waste Management for curbside collection service ends in August 2022. The Town Board will be soliciting bids for a new contract beginning in spring.

The cost for the entire year of trash and recycling curbside service is added to your property tax bill as a special charge. The cost in 2021 is \$12.58 per month for trash and \$3.76 per month for recycling, calculating out to \$16.34 monthly, or \$196.08 for the year.

Please note that carts MUST be at the curb no later than 6:00AM. Waste Management will NOT return to collect if you forget or are late. This is a good reason to put your carts out the night before your scheduled collection.

Issues with the timing of your trash or recycling collection can occur for many reasons. Holidays often cause delays because of changes in workers or routes. If your trash or recycling collection is delayed, please check the Town website, or call the Town Hall trash/ recycling number,  $262.675.6009 \times 102$ for updates. It is usually recommended that you leave your cart at the road until it is collected, which often occurs within a day or two. However, in cer-

tain circumstances, the delay could be longer.

Since the Spring Town Crier newsletter, the process for residents to report trash and recycling concerns has changed. Waste Manage-

ment has requested that residents contact the Call Center directly at 888.960.0008 to report cart repair needs, including lids and wheels, as well as missed trash and recycling collection. If you are on hold with Waste Management Customer Service for more than ten minutes, leave a message at the Town Hall trash/recycling number, 262.675.6009 x102 or send an email to recycling@townoftrenton.wi.gov.

Lids on the carts should be closed, but in most cases, as long as the contents are secured, open or gaping lids should not cause any problems. Remember that trash should be bagged, but recycling should be loose. However, carts that are stuffed tightly will restrict the contents from emptying into the cart.

The GFL Transfer Station on North River Road will accept, <u>for a fee</u>, items that cannot be left for curbside collection, such as construction debris, mattresses and other large items.

## **CONCRETE DRIVEWAYS**

Town ordinances prohibit concrete in the road right-of-way, which means that the last ten feet of the driveway measured from the edge of the town road towards your home—cannot be concrete. Note that these concrete driveway restrictions do NOT apply to residents living on private roads in the Town.

Permits are required when installing or replacing a driveway. Failure to obtain a permit will result in additional fees.

# FIRE NUMBERS

Town ordinance §174-15 requires each property owner to display and maintain an address sign at their residence. If the address sign is destroyed or lost, "the property owner shall order and pay for a replacement address sign **from the Town of Trenton** within 30 days". Failure to display an address sign in violation of the ordinance is subject to a citation.

The Fire Department recommends use of the flag-style address signs, which have been available for several years. Because they are highly visible, these large, reflective, double-sided signs are extremely important when responding to an emergency call.

Beginning in Spring 2022, the Town will be issuing citations for residences that are out of compliance with this ordinance. If you need an address sign, be sure to order one soon. Residents with orders on file will not be fined.

The cost of the sign, post, and installation is only \$55. Order forms may be obtained by mail (call 262.675.6009), in person at the Town Hall, or by visiting the Building Permit page of the town's website (www.townoftrenton.wi.gov).

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## PUBLIC WORKS Town Hall Yard Hours

The Public works Department is available to receive brush, waste oil, batteries and metal goods. The Town yard is open on the second Saturday of each month from 8:00AM—12NOON for this service. From March through October, it is also open on the fourth Thursday of each month from 4:00—8:00PM.

### Let it Snow!

Snow season will be upon us before we know it. During a snow event, the Department of Public Works first plows the MAIN roads, then the "collector" roads, such as Paradise (roads that feed into the main roads). Next, the "arterial" roads, such as Trenton and South Oak (roads that get you from one main road to another) are plowed. Finally, the drivers will get to the secondary roads, and finish with subdivisions. Because the main roads must accommodate more traffic, they must be cleared first. The DPW thanks you for your patience as they work through to your particular road.

The snowplows will get as close to mailboxes as they can but ultimately Town residents are responsible for clearing snow from in front of and 15 feet to each side of their mailboxes.

Occasionally, mailboxes are knocked down during a storm. Most mailboxes are not hit by the snow plow, but instead are hit by the snow roll coming off the plow. Now is a good time to check your mailbox and post to make sure it is sturdy and secure.

If the Town snowplow knocks down a mailbox, the Public Works Department will put it back up as time permits. Ultimately **it is the** 



homeowner's responsibility to make sure a mailbox is in place and accessible to allow for mail delivery.

Town ordinances prohibit blowing or pushing snow from driveways onto roadways. For everyone's safety, please refrain from leaving any snow on the roads as you clear the end of your driveway. Parking on Town roads is not allowed, as Town ordinances specify that parked vehicles should have all tires OFF the road. This restriction is especially important in the winter months, when snowplows need the space to properly clear the snow.

Please be considerate of the snowplows: slow down, give the drivers room to do their work and pass snow plows with caution.

The Town continues to be mindful of the cost of salt. To that end, salting will be done mainly on intersections. In addition, salt will be spread after storms. Be aware of icy conditions and drive with caution! Driving slowly is the best way to prevent accidents.

## **ELECTIONS**

## **Odd Years vs Even Years**

Have you noticed that 2021 only had elections in the spring? That is true for odd years, unless there is a special election for some reason, such as when a candidate resigns mid-term.

During even years, the fall elections cover the offices of U.S. President, State Governor and other State and Federal Legislators.

### **Voter Registration**

Register to vote as soon as you are eligible. You can register online, by mail, in the municipal clerk's office or at the polling place on Election Day. Proof of residence is required. Registering online is easy if your Wisconsin Driver's License or State ID card has your current address.

Documents that prove residence include a current Driver's License or State ID card, bank or credit card statement, utility bill, property tax bill or receipt, paycheck or pay stub, and others. Certain restrictions apply in each case. For exam-



ple, to prove residence, a Driver's License cannot be expired but it may be revoked or suspended. A utility bill cannot be for a period more than 90 days before registration.

#### Photo ID

Photo ID, or Proof of Identification is different from Proof of Residence. Photo ID is required to obtain a ballot on Election Day. You must be a registered voter to request a ballot, and at that time you present your Photo ID. A Wisconsin Driver's License or State ID card is the most common form of Photo ID. A U.S. Passport is another example. For Photo ID purposes, a Driver's Li-

cense, State ID card or Passport MAY be expired, as long as it expired after the last General Election (currently that date is November 3, 2020).

#### Voting in the Town

The Town of Trenton has one polling place: the Town Hall at 1071 State Hwy 33E. Polls are open on election day from 7:00 AM—8:00 PM. Absentee voting is available, which can be accomplished by mail or in person before each election.

#### **Election Inspectors**

Election Inspectors, also known as Poll Workers, conduct assigned duties at a polling location on Election Day. Duties include issuing ballots to registered voters, registering voters, monitoring the voting equipment, explaining how to mark the ballot or use the voting equipment.. Contact Clerk Cindy Komro if you are interested in becoming an Election Inspector.

#### My Vote Wisconsin

My Vote Wisconsin (<u>myvote.wi.gov</u>) is the place to go to review your voter record, find your polling place and what's on your ballot, register to vote, change your name or address, request and track your absentee ballot and lots more.

#### WEC

The Wisconsin Elections Commission (WEC) administers and enforces Wisconsin elections law, and is made up of six members.

The WEC's website (<u>elections.wi.gov</u>) is a great resource for all state election information.
