Curbside Collection Contract

The curbside collection contract with Waste Management ends on December 31, 2022. It is expected that the monthly cost will increase with whichever provider ultimately serves the Town of Trenton.

Requests for Proposal (RFP) will be solicited to be received for consideration by October 18. Supervisor Jeff Esselmann has chaired a committee of residents to prepare the Request for Proposal available to contractors during the bidding process. Specific terms requested in the new contract include the following:

- \Rightarrow Streamlined process for reporting collection issues, including an online portal on the town's website
- ⇒ Dedicated Customer Service representative available on collection days from 7:00 am-5:00 pm
- \Rightarrow Missed service resolved within 24 hours
- \Rightarrow Collection hours 6:00 am-5:00 pm
- ⇒ Annual "bulk items" disposal event at the Town Hall for items that do not fit in the curbside cart
- \Rightarrow Seasonal dumpster at the Town Hall for residents to dispose of yard waste (leaves, sod, etc.)
- \Rightarrow Continued annual electronic waste event at Town Hall

Note that these terms are not guaranteed, but it is our hope that some of these services will be offered in the proposals received.

Updates on the new contract will be posted on the town's website, <u>townoftrenton.wi.gov</u>, as new information becomes available. In addition, we hope that the 2023 collection cal-

endar will be included in your property tax bill mailing. However, depending on when the contract will ultimately be awarded, the timing may not be conducive to this expectation. So, watch the website, tell your neighbor or contact the Clerk in December. Mailing a letter to all residents with updates would cost about \$2,000, so we'd like to use alternative means of communication.

Seasonal Reminders

Autumn brings falling leaves and the difficulty of disposing them. Chopping leaves into mulch for gardens and flower beds is an environmentally conscious option. Residents with a large amount of leaves can offer to share mulch with a neighbor. Town ordinances allow

burning of small camp fires, brush and leaves. However, burning of noxious materials (including roofing and other building mate-

rials) is prohibited. Violating the burning ordinance is subject to Town citations as well as review by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

As we welcome autumn, we also look ahead to winter. Town ordinances prohibit shoveling, plowing, dumping, pushing or otherwise discharging snow, ice, slush or a combination thereof onto any Town road. Failure to comply with this ordinance will result in a citation.

In addition, residents are required to keep mailboxes accessible by clearing the snow around them. If a mailbox is damaged during a snow plowing event, contact the Town Department of Public Works. If the damage was caused by the plow, the Town will replace it with a metal mailbox. If the damage was caused by the force of snow, the Town is not responsible for repair or replacement.

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ELECTIONS

November 8 Election

The November 8 Fall General Election is quickly approaching. A high turnout (90%) of registered voters is expected.

Due to the limited space inside the Town Hall, long lines are difficult to manage. Accommodating 90% of the town's 3,500 registered voters requires about ten hours, assuming we can consistently check in six voters every minute throughout the day. Certain times on election day are typically busier: at the opening of the polls at 7:00 AM, around noon and from 4:00 PM until the polls close at 8:00 PM. Please plan ahead and avoid these busy times if possible.



Voters arriving during a busy time may be asked to wait outside or in their vehicles so that the Town Hall does not become overcrowded. After taking a number to manage the voting order, an electronic sign will inform voters when the voting area is ready for the next group.

Please make sure you have your Photo ID ready when you enter the polling place so that we may check you in quickly.

Absentee Voting

One way to avoid the lines on election day is to vote by Absentee.

tion for Absentee Ballot (Form EL-121) to the Town Clerk.

Be sure to follow the instructions enclosed with your absentee ballot. Failure to follow the instructions could cause your ballot to be rejected at the polls. The most common reasons absentee ballots are rejected include:

- Voter failing to sign the ballot certificate envelope
- Witness failing to sign the ballot certificate envelope
- Witness failing to supply his or her address on the ballot certificate envelope
- Ballot returned by a person other than the voter or placed in the drop box

If the Clerk finds any of these issues, your ballot will be returned to you so that you may attempt to satisfy the requirements before election day. Oftentimes there is not enough time to accomplish this, so it is CRITICAL to read, understand and follow the instructions included in the packet containing your ballot.

Voting Absentee in person is available at designated times (see above) or by appointment, beginning October 25.

<u>Registration</u>

Registering on Election Day is allowed, HOWEVER, be aware that this process takes additional time and lengthens the wait-

ing time for everyone. Registration online or by mail is easy, but the deadline for this option for the November 8 election is October 19. Oftentimes, voters attempt to register online after this date and are surprised when they have to start over on election day. After this date you MUST register in the Clerk's office. The deadline to register in person is 5:00 PM on November 4.

Accessible Voting

All Wisconsin voters have a right to cast a ballot privately and independently at their polling place on Election Day. The Help America Vote Act (HAVA) requires that every polling place in the State meets Americans With D is a b i l i t i e s A c t (ADA) accessibility standards. This requirement includes accessible voting machines.

Voters voting at the polling place in Wisconsin are required to sign the poll list before receiving a ballot. You are exempt from this requirement if you cannot sign the poll list because of a



physical disability. The election inspectors will write "exempt by order of inspectors" in the signature line and issue you a ballot.

Voters may vote curbside (voting without leaving your vehicle) if they cannot enter the polling location. To request curbside voting, call the Clerk on election day either before or as soon as you arrive at the town hall for voting.

Ballot Basics

The Fall General Election is always non-partisan, allowing voters to vote for candidates regardless of party. For example, you may vote for a Governor candidate in one party and a State Assembly candidate in another party.

When completing your ballot, please be sure to completely fill in the oval next to your choice. The voting equipment will reject your ballot if it has difficulty determining your vote. You will be able to correct it before inserting it again into the ballot box but completing it sufficiently the first time will make voting day progress Page 3

more smoothly for everyone. These are examples of correct and incorrect markings:



Voting Assistance

If you need help marking your ballot on Election Day, you may take anyone you choose with you into the voting booth, except your employer or your labor union representative. After you have marked your ballot, the person helping you must then sign the ballot in the space provided. The election workers will write the name of your assistor on the voting list. Your assistor does not need to be qualified to vote.

Be Informed

Be an informed voter by reviewing the sample ballot before each election, available at the Town Hall or online at *MyVote.Wl.gov.*

INVASIVE SPECIES

Two recently introduced invasive plants to our neighborhoods are Wild Parsnip and Purple Loosestrife. Both of these have impacts on the local ecosystem function as well as biodiversity. Why are these important to you? There are economic impacts to our agriculture and recreational industries as well as increasing the costs of our infrastructure maintenance (ditches, retention basins, etc.). Plus the impact on our



health. Wild parsnip contains toxic compounds, called furanocoumarins. These compounds can cause serious rashes, burns, or blisters to skin exposed to the sap and then sunlight. The plant poses a risk to residents and agricultural workers who unknowingly become exposed to the plant in the wild.

PROPERTY TAX Where Does My Tax Go?

Did you know that of your entire property tax bill, only about 13% remains with the Town of Trenton? Your tax is paid to the Town of Trenton and the Town then distributes it to Washington County, West Bend School District and Moraine Park Technical College (MPTC). The pie chart at right shows the distribution of the 2021 tax levies.

Tax Bills

Your property tax bill will be available for viewing sometime late in November. You may review your property tax bills online as soon as they are available. They



will be mailed early in December.

Your property tax bill mailing will include an instruction sheet with valuable information about paying your taxes, including hours for paying in person. A 2023 trash and recycling collection calendar will be printed on the back side of the instruc-

tions IF THE VEN-NEW HAS DOR BEEN CHO-SEN IN TIME (see cover article regarding refuse and recycling). For your convenience, a dog license application (for up

to three dogs) will also be included.
