<u>Merger</u>

Waste Management acquired Advanced Disposal late last year. Waste Management is the new provider of our curbside trash and recycling services.

Curbside Collection Reminders

Curbside collection at the Town of Trenton is available for all Town residents, and takes place on Thursday or Friday of each week, depending on your location. The annual collection calendar is always included in your property tax bill, and is available on our website or by calling the Town Hall.

Please be mindful of the manner of waste disposal. Trash should be secured in bags. Throwing small items loosely in the trash cart increases the risk of debris littering the Town roads when the carts are tipped into the trucks. However, RECYCLING should NOT be placed in plastic bags. Instead, flattening cardboard and plastic items is advised to minimize flying recycling items. Placing paper recyclables in PAPER bags is acceptable.

The former Advanced Disposal Transfer Station on River Road is now owned by GFL, and is no longer available for Town of Trenton residents to use for items that cannot be left for curbside collection. Non-Hazardous waste such as tires, yard waste and construction debris can be taken to the Waste Management Orchard Ridge Facility at W124 N9355 Boundary Road, Menomonee Falls. Pedestrian Safety

As the weather warms, people are itching to get out and stretch their legs. Drivers should be cautious of walkers, joggers and cyclists. Give

SIGN PERMITS

State Statutes and Town Ordinances govern the permitted uses of yard signs.

The following signs are allowed without a permit:

- \checkmark Real Estate "For Sale" signs not exceeding eight square feet in size
- Small signs (not exceeding two square feet in size) advertising a permitted home-based business
- Yard Sale signs not exceeding two square feet

them ample space and share the road. Keep a keen eye out for those operating motorcycles: be alert and look twice. On rural roads with no sidewalks, and narrow or nonexistent shoulders, pedestrians should walk or jog AGAINST traffic, and keep their eyes on the road, rather than on their mobile phones. In addition, use of high-visibility safety apparel is advised.

Burning Brush

Please be mindful when burning brush. Keep a sharp eye on the weather conditions. Right now, most of Wisconsin (including Washington County), is in an elevated forest/brush fire danger zone. If you do plan to burn, contact the Washington County Sheriff's nonemergency number (262-335-4378) and check with the Newburg Fire Department (262-675-6262) to make sure there is no burn ban in place. Make a burn plan and keep a readily available supply of water on hand. If the fire does get out of control, call 911 immediately. Refrain from burning anything that may release noxious or potentially harmful smoke.

We routinely receive questions about ATV/UTV (All Terrain Vehicle and Utility Vehicle) road routes. There are no legal road routes for ATV/UTVs within the Trenton Township. ATV/ UTVs can be legally operated on your

FIRE DEPARTMENT

I hope everyone had a great winter and is staying safe during the Covid-19 pandemic.

As a reminder, all property owners must maintain their driveway as per town ordinance 174-19(9) Brush Clearance. All brush, trees, shrubs and vegetation of any kind should be cleared and cut back a minimum of six feet from each side of the center line of the driveway, a minimum of 12 feet above the driveway and for the entire length of the driveway, including the access point with the Town roadway. If we are dispatched for an emergency call at your property and our vehicles are damaged due to low hanging tree branches or other vegetation, the owner farm or piece of nonagricultural property does not meet this definition unless the dwelling is on the same piece of property as the farm. For a complete list of rules and regulations related to ATV/UTV operation please visit the Wisconsin DNR website and search "ATV regulations".

STRAY CATS

Surrender Fees

Beginning January 1, 2021 Town of Trenton residents surrendering a cat or kitten at the Washington County Humane Society (WCHS) will be required to pay a fee of \$38 per feline to cover part of the costs WCHS will incur in preparing the animal for adoption. Note that this fee is subject to change without notice.

In prior years the Town had a cat contract with WCHS, reimbursing WCHS each year based on the number of cats & kittens surrendered by Town residents. The Humane Society has provided the Town with a list of the addresses associated with the feline surrenders, including the number of cats and kittens surrendered from each of those addresses. The Town Board noted that nearly half the cats and kittens surrendered came from just three addresses in the Town. There are many Town budgetary pressures each year, and the Board felt that it could not justify continuing the cat contract with WCHS in 2021.

Some facts about the Washington County Humane Society:

- It receives <u>no</u> State funding
- It receives <u>no</u> County funding
- It <u>does</u> receive a portion of the dog license fees collected by each municipality, obligating it to accept surrendered and stray dogs.

PROPERTY REVALUATION "open" for public inspec-

A complete property assessment revaluation was performed for 2021 by Grota Appraisals, the Town Assessor. All Town residents were recently sent their 2021 assessment. Additional information regarding the revaluation was included. These documents are also available on the Assessor page of the Town's website.

Questions regarding the revaluation should be directed to Grota Appraisals during "Open Book," the period of time where the completed assessment roll is tion so residents may compare their assessed value with that of other properties.

The Board of Review is held for residents who feel their assessment doesn't reflect the actual market value of their property. Evidence must be presented in support of the objection. To appear before the Board of Review, taxpayers must provide written or oral notice of the intent to file an objection. Specific instructions for filing an objection are available on the Town's website or by contacting Clerk Cindy Komro.

into cat contracts with WCHS but are not required to do so.

 WCHS is not obligated to accept or pick up stray cats or kittens from any municipality unless it has a cat contract with that municipality.

The Humane Society's operating funds come from donations, fundraisers, its share of the dog license fees, cat contracts with municipalities and adoption fees.

Marnie Brown, Executive V. Director of WCHS, estimates that it costs about \$76 to prepare a cat or kitten for adoption. Felines are tested for feline immunodeficiency virus (FIV), spayed or neutered, and receive vaccinations. Cats and kittens available for

adoption are then posted to the WCHS website, <u>www.wchspets.org</u>.

Thinking about adding a cat to your household? Cats three years of age and older are *free* at WCHS. These cats are spayed or neutered and will be up-to-date on shots.

The WCHS "Barn Buddies" program is very popular with owners of outdoor cats. It offers a low cost spay/ neuter, distemper, and rabies vaccines for barn cats. The
