## New Website!

We are pleased to announce the launch of a completely redesigned website! Same address, different look: <u>townoftrenton.wi.gov</u>.

The website has more information and improved search functionality to help residents find what they need. Quick links exist for pages that are visited frequently. Content is streamlined to easily find meeting agendas and minutes, building permits, zoning assistance, election notices, property tax information, and more. A moving banner displays important messages as needed, such as election notices or property taxes information.

Residents can sign up for notifications via text or email. Currently, a general notification group exists to receive all notices. Future expansion of this feature will allow users to choose the notifications they wish to receive, such as meeting reminders, refuse/recycling issues, road repair news, election notices and property tax information. Subscribing or cancelling this service is quick and easy. Visit <u>townoftrenton.wi.gov</u> and click on "Subscribe to Notifications."

We will continue to add content and make improvements to the website on an ongoing basis. Regular "Communications from the Chairman" will be available with news more often than this Town Crier publication which is only published twice annually.

## Road Work

The repaving of Wallace Lake Road was finished in 2023, and about \$16,000 is expected to be returned from a Local Road Improvement Program (LRIP) grant. Reimbursement for \$88,000 of the Tuscola Lane cul-

vert replacement was expected in 2024 but was received this year! With those funds, the town was able to schedule additional repaving work this year, including portions of Maple, Creek, and Sandy Acre Roads.

## Newark Drive

The Newark Drive Rehabilitation Project was the most significant road reconstruction work completed in 2023. Newark Drive marks the northern border of the town. The ongoing repair and maintenance costs are shared with the Town of Farmington. Trenton's portion, between Trenton and Indian Lore Roads, was rebuilt this summer at a cost of over \$1,000,000. A road grant, expected in 2024, will reimburse the town for 66% of the total cost.

## Road Reconstruction Costs

The condition of town roads has suffered over the years because of

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lack of funds. The annual town tax levy is just under \$1,000,000 and annual increases are typically less than \$1,000 (less than a tenth of a percent). With other costs in the budget increasing an average of 3% annually, this limits the funds available for road work. State Shared Revenue and transportation grants help but are not enough to keep up with the maintenance needs of the 67 miles of town roads.

## Paying for Road Work

The town's regular annual budget cannot sustain a \$1.3 million road



project like Newark Drive. The transportation grant terms require full payment before reimbursement can be requested. For this reason, the town board early this year approved

using debt service to pay for rebuilding Newark Drive. The annual debt service on the loan will be added to the town levy for up to the next five years. The effect of the loan on 2023 property tax bills will be about \$150 on a property assessed at \$300,000.

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## **BUILDING & ZONING**

#### **Building Permits**

The Town of Trenton requires a building permit for many improvements on your property, including:

- New home
- Home addition
- Deck
- New roof
- Siding replacement
- Accessory structures (detached garage, shed)
- Fences
- Electrical work
- Plumbing work
- HVAC work

Note that this list is not all-inclusive. If you are unsure whether your project requires a permit, contact the Building Inspector at 262.675.0415.

## the town hall on Wednesdays from 3:00-5:00 p.m. to meet with residents for permitting needs.

#### <u>Zoning</u>

Are you interested in building a shed on your property? Do you want to subdivide your property? Do you know how many animals are allowed on your property? These questions, and many more, are directed to the Town Administrator on a daily basis.

The town website has answers to some of these zoning questions. Continued improvements to the website will include access to additional information and forms. Residents can also contact Town Administrator Cindy Komro. Often, an inperson consultation is advised. #### New Equipment

Winter Reminders Annual reminders for when the snow flies:

 Keep area a r o u n d mailboxes clear of snow to allow suffi-



cient space for Postal Service vehicles to approach.

- Never push snow onto the roads when clearing your driveway; this is a safety risk and subject to a citation.
- Reduce speed on town roads as snow and ice conditions warrant, especially at intersections.

## Register to Vote

Plan ahead and make sure you are registered to vote prior to election day! Proof of residence is required when registering. If you are new to the town, have moved within the township, or have a name change, you will need to register to vote. This can be done in the Clerk's office, but it is easiest to register online at **myvote.wi.gov**.

You can also register at the polls on election day, but there could be long lines so please plan accordingly.

If you are a registered voter, you can request an absentee ballot <u>after Jan I.</u> <u>2024</u>, for an individual election or the entire calendar year. The Post Office cannot forward election material, so please make sure you are putting the correct address

on your request if you will be out of town.

The WI Election Commission has approved a new Voter certificate envelope and a new mailing envelope. The directions are very similar to the envelopes in the past. Please make sure the certificate envelope is filled out correctly by yourself and your witness or your ballot will not be accepted.

## **CAFOs**

The Town of Trenton may be home to its first CAFO in the near future. A CAFO (Concentrated Animal Feeding Operation) is an agricultural meat, dairy, or egg facility where animals are kept and raised in confinement.

Recently, the town adopted an ordinance that created a new zoning district to allow CAFOs only in that district. A Conditional Use Permit is required as well, which gives the town some ability to oversee operations.

## State DATCP Registration

The State of Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) requires registration of any property where livestock "congregate." This includes family farms, hobby farms, backyard poultry flocks, veterinary clinics, markets, livestock feedlots, livestock dealers, and haulers.

The goal of this rule movements livestock within 48 hours in case of an animal disease outbreak, to find where an infection originated and what animals have been exposed.

#### 2024 Property Revaluation

Trenton properties will undergo a statistic revaluation in 2024. Revaluation is required when the town's level of assessment is lower than 93%. This revaluation does not require a "walk-through."

In most cases, the reassessment process does not result in a significant change in a property's tax bill. The exception is when a property's assessed value changes more than the average over the entire town.
